Regular registration for the summer quarter was scheduled for Thursday and Friday, June 14 and 15. Classes will begin Monday, June 18, and late registration will be accepted Monday, June 18, through Friday, June 22, the first week of classes. Students not enrolled in a degree program may register during the first week of classes without a late registration fee.

FAU ANNOUNCES HURRICANE POLICY

Because of the numerous questions arising regarding hurricanes, UPDATE is publishing the University's policy to be followed in case a Hurricane Watch or Hurricane Warning is announced by the U.S. Weather Bureau.

In the event of hurricane danger in the south Florida area, Florida Atlantic University takes its cue from official U.S. Weather Bureau Advisories. These bulletins are widely circulated and are heard almost continuously on radio or TV. This makes it possible for students and faculty to determine whether or not they should plan on coming to classes.

The Weather Bureau issues a Hurricane Watch when it appears that the storm will hit the coast. The Watch usually covers an area of several hundred miles. Subsequently, as the direction of the storm becomes more certain, the Weather Bureau issues a Hurricane Warning, narrowing down the area in which the storm is likely to strike. It is this Hurricane Warning that triggers the closing of the University or its branch campuses if they are in the Hurricane Warning area.

Essentially, the policy directs that classes will remain in session until the Weather Bureau posts its official Hurricane Warning. At that time, all classes and offices will close until the danger is over.

However, even if conditions are normal in Boca Raton, no student or faculty member is expected to leave his home if Hurricane Warnings have been posted there or if he would have to drive through areas where Hurricane Warnings have been posted.

The same conditions apply for the Fort Lauderdale Center, the West Palm Beach Center and classes in any other locations.

Residence halls will remain open during the storm period for the convenience of resident students who cannot go home. Faculty and staff may refer to Administrative Memorandum No. 38 for complete details for the University's Hurricane Emergency Plan.

Dr. Dennis R. Nicewander, acting vice president of Administrative Affairs has issued the Following Hurricane Emergency Plan notice:

Deans and directors should review Administrative Memorandum No. 38, April 25, 1973, Hurricane Emergency Plan. A revised Building Supervisors list is being prepared and will be distributed soon. Subsequently, a meeting of designated building supervisors and other persons assigned duties in the Hurricane Emergency Plan will be convened to review and coordinate emergency procedures.

POLI SCI IS NUMBER ONE

A study published in the spring edition of *Political Science*, gives FAU's Department of Political Science the number one spot in the nation in research productivity on a per capita basis. Florida State and the University of Florida, the only other Florida colleges in the top 100, are in the 6th and 46th spots. Ranking behind FAU are Carnegie Mellon, Kentucky, Emory and the University of Rochester. Harvard is 30th and Yale 40th.

The study covered the years 1968 through 1977 and set out to determine if the departments with national reputations for excellence actually had more research accepted for publication in quality journals and books than smaller, less well-known departments.

The per capita feature was built into the study to compensate for the vast difference in numbers of faculty at large and small schools. However, even on a simple productivity table which bears no relationship to size, FAU ranked 29th.

STATE HEALTH PLAN AMENDED

In order to comply with the Pregnancy Discrimination Act, Public Law 95-555, the following changes related to pregnancy, childbirth and related conditions, have been made, effective April 29, 1979, in the State of Florida Employee's Group Health Self-Insurance Plan.

1. Employees with individual coverage who incur covered hospital, medical-surgical expenses on or after April 29, 1979, will be reimbursed by the Plan.
2. The 270-day waiting period shall not apply whether insured under individual or family coverage.
3. The five-day hospital benefit limitation shall not apply whether insured under individual or family coverage.

The Department of Administration believes that for the foreseeable future the cost of this additional coverage can be absorbed without the necessity of a rate increase.

STATE HEALTH PLAN BENEFIT DOCUMENT AMENDED

Amendments have been made to the Benefit Document for the State Group Health Self-Insurance Plan as follows:

1. Effective June 1, 1979, the Benefit Document is amended to pay 80 percent of the hospital's average semi-private room rate, not to exceed an actual payment of \$76 per day. This amendment also provides for payment of 80 percent of the actual charge for use of the hospital's intensive care unit, not to exceed an actual payment equal to the lesser of twice the hospital's average semi-private room rate or \$152 per day.
2. Effective June 1, 1979, the Benefit Document is amended to allow payment of hospital or ambulatory surgical center outpatient services at 100 percent without being subject to the limits of the Approved Fee Schedule. However, charges by a physician for treatment of an accident or illness in the outpatient department of a hospital or ambulatory surgical center will be subject to the maximum limits of the Approved Fee Schedule.

The Department of Administration does not contemplate any change in premium rates in the near future as a result of these changes.

AVMED HEALTH PLAN ENROLLMENT PERIOD ANNOUNCED

Notification has been received from the State Division of Personnel that the Avmmed Health Plan, a federally qualified Health Maintenance Organization (HMO), has been approved for expansion of its service area to Broward County.

University employees who reside in Broward County may enroll in Avmmed as an alternative to the State Employees Group Health Self Insurance Plan during a group enrollment period from June 18 through June 29.

GRANTS AWARDED

Dr. Roger A. Messenger and Dr. Leroy Buckner have been awarded state of Florida grants recently.

Dr. Messenger received a grant of \$12,018 from the State Energy Office of the Florida Department of Administration for a study to determine to what extent Florida's college students are aware of the nation's energy problems.

Through a survey of all SUS faculty members, Dr. Messenger will identify faculty with an interest in the energy problem and determine which courses include energy topics. He will also seek recommendations on effective ways energy concepts can be incorporated into the university experience.

Assisting with the research will be Shirley Hayes and Jill McClelland, energy education specialists, and Sue Chanson, a research assistant.

Dr. Buckner received a \$8,000 grant from the Florida Department of Education. The grant will fund a one-week workshop to be held on campus from June 25 to 29 for distributive education teachers from high schools and community colleges throughout the state of Florida.
