Universities have grown up gradually and their traditions have become fixed with centuries of development. American colleges and universities have adopted many old-world ideas, methods and practices, and trace their tradition to Bologna and Paris. Student societies have

always existed, and always in such groups there have been the novices and the initiated. College fraternities, of course, emphasize most definitely the traditions of the student societies; but local clubs, such as those at Yale, Harvard and Princeton, and "plebe" traditions of our military academies, illustrate the same tendencies which have always been seen in student societies.

FAU Evening History Courses

Three evening history classes to be offered this Fall at FAU's Boca Campus are open to both non-degree seeking students and to those enrolled in degree programs.

The courses, all scheduled to meet from 6-9:50 p.m., cover a variety of topics. "U.S. Political Party History," taught by Dr. Donald Curl, surveys the origin and growth of national political parties, emphasizing presidential elections. "History of Eastern Ideas," taught by Dr. Tsung-I Dow, studies Eastern thought from Confucianism to Buddhism through to more modern developments. The third course is "World War II," taught by Dr. John O'Sullivan.

Registration for non-degree seeking students will take place Friday, August 22. Complete course schedules are available in the Admissions Office on the first floor of the Administration Building, 393-3040.

Florida residents who are 60 or above may register during the first week of classes (August 25-29) with the permission of the instructor on a no-fee, non-credit, space-available basis.

Deadline to register for CLAST

The deadline to register for the September 27 administration of the College Level Academic Skills Test (CLAST) is August 29. Sophomores who will be completing 55 credits during the Fall semester are required to take the test, as are all new upper division transfer students. Students may register for the test in Testing and Evaluation, Room 11 of the Administration Building.

FAU offers Japanese courses again

FAU's Department of Languages and Linguistics will offer two courses in Japanese language at the Boca Raton Campus during the Fall semester. It is the second year of the program, which is funded by a contribution from Milton and Frances Levenson of Boca Raton.

Elementary Japanese I (FOL 3100), a beginning course which will stress speaking, will be taught on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7 p.m. to 8:20 p.m. The 3-credit course may be taken on a pass/fail basis, and is open to the community as well as degree-seeking students.

Intermediate Japanese II (FOL 3201), offered for the first time this fall, is designed for students and people in the community who have some familiarity with the language or who have taken the elementary and intermediate Japanese courses offered at FAU during the 1985-86 academic year. The 3-credit course will be offered on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 5:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. Both courses will be taught by Kazuko Sakai.

The first concert to be performed by the Chorus will be Haydn's masterpiece, "The Creation," to be presented on Sunday, November 23.

Those wishing to join the Chorus are asked to sign up at the first rehearsal. A \$10 donation to help defray the cost of the music is requested from those who are not earning academic credit for their participation in the group.

FAU Registration for Fall semester

Registration at FAU for the Fall academic semester will take place Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, August 20, 21 and 22, it has been announced by FAU Registrar Blair Thorburn. Classes will begin Monday, August 25.

On August 20 and 21 the Registrar's Office will remain open from 8:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. and on August 22 the office will be open until 5 p.m.

Schedules of Fall semester courses can be obtained at the FAU Admissions Office on the first floor of the Administration building.

Volunteer tutoring program to start at FAU

You are a good student; you get A's and B's, you know how to study, and you have survived your first year or two of college. You like to help others, but only at a convenient time and place.

Does this describe you? Then you are a perfect candidate for the Peer Tutors Program (PTP), a new student organization forming this fall. The goal of PTP is to offer free tutoring to students in need of assistance in their university course work.

There is a great need for volunteer tutors on this campus. Courses at FAU are not easy, and

many students find themselves looking for outside help but unable to afford the \$10 an hour some tutors charge. FAU needs a *volunteer* tutoring service in which the whole college community can participate. Faculty and staff members are invited to become advisors for PTP and share their expertise in educational and academic areas. Students of all abilities and interests can join PTP, either as tutors or as volunteers to help run the program. Anyone who does above-average to average work in a subject they like, would be interested in sharing their knowledge of that subject with others, and would be willing to volunteer two hours a week for

the semester, is invited to join PTP as a tutor.

Tutoring is a good volunteer activity for students because it can be tailored to fit in with their schedules and other activities. PTP will have interested students fill out a questionnaire at the beginning of the semester. On the questionnaire they would be asked about their preferences: what subject would they like to tutor, whether or not they prefer to tutor one student or a small group (two to five people), et cetera. Four to six weeks into the semester, tutors would be contacted with names and information about prospective tutees. Tutors could then set up appointments with their tutees at

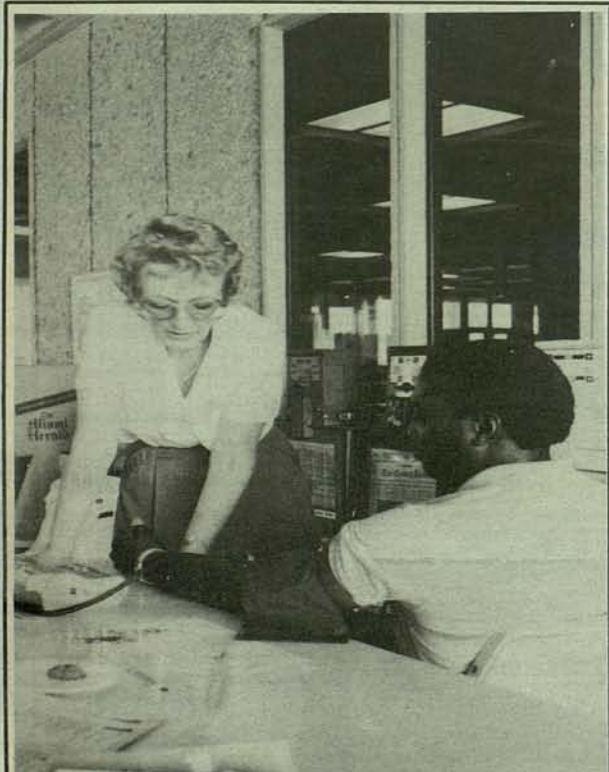
whatever time and place is most convenient with them.

Tutoring is beneficial, not only to the students who receive help, but also to the students who tutor. It can strengthen your own recall of a subject, be a release from academic pressures, and improve your communication skills. It gives you a chance to contribute to the academic life of FAU and, most importantly, it is a rewarding experience that can enrich your life and foster a better understanding of other people.

Another tutoring program is also in the planning stage, to begin in the fall term. Dr. Kenneth Michels, Vice President of Academic Affairs, and Harold Wayne, Director of the Society of

Older Students, have talked of a program which would have, as volunteer tutors, SOS members who are retired educators. Through the cooperation of PTP and SOS, as well as various other departments of FAU, tutoring would be available for all the different problems students encounter in their studies.

PTP asks that if you would like to be part of shaping a new movement in student involvement, and want to have a long-lasting effect on FAU, consider joining the Peer Tutors Program. Sign up on one of the sign-up sheets posted around campus, or contact Rebekah or Anil at 368-4868, or leave a message with the SOS office at ext. 3171.

Delta Phi Epsilon will be interviewing FAU women this fall to form a chapter of that sorority on this campus.

Founded in 1917 at the New York University Law School, the sorority is already represented in this state at the University of Florida and the University of Miami. Thousands of alumnae from all the chapters in the United States and Canada reside in the area, and the Greater Miami Alumnae Association is an active member of the Miami Alumnae Panhellenic.

Delta Phi Epsilon is, by original charter, non-sectarian, and is

represented on 42 campuses in the United States and Canada. Proud of its outstanding record in community service, it supports the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation and the ANAD (the foundation dealing with the problems of those stricken with anorexia nervosa, bulimia and associated eating disorders.) At the University of Florida, members of the chapter developed an Ice Cream Eating Contest that raised thousands of dollars each year for C/F and was an event that has become a tradition on campus. After almost 15 years, the chapter is creating a new "gimmick."

Each odd year, the international convention provides a forum for meeting sisters from Dartmouth, (N.H.) in the North, to the University of British Columbia (Vancouver) in the Northwest, to Texas (Austin) in the South and all points in between. A staff of professional chapter consultants and the regional and national volunteer officers of the sorority are on hand to assist chapters in their efforts to have the best sorority experience possible. Delta Phi Epsilon looks forward to joining the FAU family in the fall.

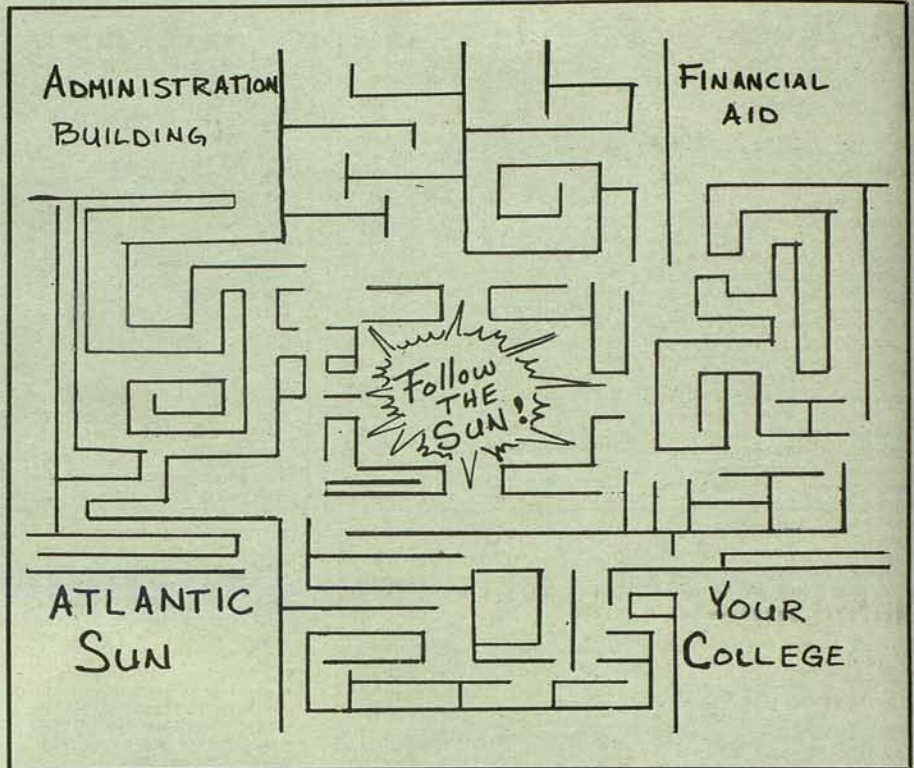

An open letter to the student body

What the *Atlantic Sun* is — what it is not...

The *Sun* is the student newspaper of FAU. It was created for two basic purposes: 1) to provide students with news about this university; 2) to allow those who are interested to gain some experience in writing.

The people who put together this newspaper are students just like you. They attend classes; study; work at other jobs; write, edit and lay out the paper; and in the little time left, engage in some semblance of a social life. In short, they are a hard-working bunch. And though they receive some compensation, not one of them does it for the money.

We try to cover events as best we can given time, budgetary and personnel requirements. And we are not perfect. But as I said in the first paragraph, this is a learning experience.

This brings up another point: why do we print some of the articles that we do?

Simple — this is a newspaper for the students. We feel they have a right to express their views, regardless of whether they coincide with those of the *Sun* staff. Or, for that matter, the rest of the student body. If we can fit an article into the paper we generally will, with few restrictions on subject matter.

That's why you'll see articles with which you may not agree. I don't agree with them all, either. But I wasn't hired to head up our Censorship Department (we don't have one); I was hired to help get the paper out to you, regardless of my feelings on the content of some of its articles. Besides, anyone so inclined may write a rebuttal to anything appearing within these pages.

The *Sun* has been badmouthed because some of its features have criticized the administration currently in the White House. If I have any say in the matter, more of this will be forthcoming. Not because I subscribe to any particular political ideology — I don't — but because I feel that, as John Stuart Mill argued in *On Liberty*: "Truth gains more even by the errors of one who, with due study and preparation, thinks for himself, than by the

true opinions of those who only hold them because they do not suffer themselves to think."

In short, if someone submits an article for publication that just may activate someone else's brain cells, it will most likely be printed. Even if that article might be considered by some to be "controversial." I'd like to know what article ever appeared in any newspaper that couldn't be considered controversial by someone.

A nation that parrots the ideal of our First Amendment (freedom of the press, etc.) should in only the most extreme cases impede the free flow of information implicit in that passage. To do so runs counter to the ideals for which so many have sacrificed. Because a country that permits but one point of view is not the kind of place where most of us would like to take up permanent residence.

I lived for three years in Spain under General Francisco Franco, a man who did not allow criticism of his regime. We, in America, should count our blessings on this point.

But I have left out what the *Sun* is not. It is not interested in celebrities who are head over heels in love, nor is it concerned with Earthlings who have been kidnapped by extraterrestrials (barring conclusive proof) The *Sun* will not tell you how to lose 30 pounds in three days.

We will do the best we can. That's all I've ever asked from anyone. That's all I expect anyone to ask from the *Sun* staff. If you have any feedback or ideas, please let us know. Thanks, and good luck this semester.

Atlantic SUN Editorial Policy Statement Fall Semester, 1986

It will be the policy of the *Atlantic Sun* to do the following throughout this semester:

- 1) To include in the *Sun* articles of interest to the Student Body, as determined by students' suggestions to the *Sun* staff;
- 2) To maintain open lines of communication between the staff of the *Sun* and the Student Body;

But wait! It all doesn't really start for about another week! Dump those school supplies into the closet and forget about your course load; you'll be facing it all soon enough!

Why not get together with your roommate, those down the hall from you, or that outrageously cute guy or girl that you met during Orientation and check out one (or better yet, all!) of the places mentioned below to get away from it all, even before it all begins!

The *Bounty Lounge* at *Holiday Inn*, 1950 Glades Road, has no cover, but does have a dance floor and *Ladies' Night* seven nights a week starting at 9p.m. There's *Happy Hour* Monday through Friday from 5-7:30p.m., with a large buffet Monday through Thursday. There's a *Pool Party* at the *Bounty Lounge* on Saturdays with ladies drinking free from 1-3p.m., and with guys drinking to *Happy Hour* prices. Also featured on Saturdays is a D.J.

Shooters, at 2280 North Federal Highway, is worth the trip up to *Boynton Beach*. It's a multi-faceted night spot where you can get together with a bunch of people to party or have your own private party for two. On Monday nights, there's classic music from the '50s, '60s and '70s, with special prices on drinks. Wednesday night is *Ladies' Night* from 8-10p.m., with ladies drinking free. On Saturdays there's a *Reggae* band, and Sunday offers *Reggae-Round-the-Clock*.

Tequila Willie's, found at 2006 Executive Drive off *Glades Road*, has *Happy Hour* Monday through Friday from 4-7p.m., with \$1.50 *Margaritas* and a small buffet. Monday turns into "Monday Madness" with bottled beers for \$2. *Tequila Specials* are also offered from 9p.m. to closing. Tuesday is "Tropical Night," so dress for the beach. There are tropical drink specials from 9p.m. to closing. Wednesday is *Ladies' Night*, ladies drink free from 7-10p.m. and there's a D.J. from 9p.m.-1:30a.m. Thursday is *Tie Night*. Ladies sporting a tie drink free from 10-11p.m. Guys with a tie drink free from 11p.m.-12a.m. Note that I.D. will be required to get into *Tequila Willie's*.



Also not to be forgotten is *Friday's*, at 5800 Glades Road and *Bennigan's* found at 2420 North Federal Highway. Both places have large and varied menus with drink specials at various times, and both atmospheres are casual and fun! There is also *Dirty Moe's* at 395 N.E. Spanish River Blvd., which features a good raw bar and plenty of company as you'll see as

you try to squeeze in some night! Above are only a few places in the area you might want to check out before school starts. 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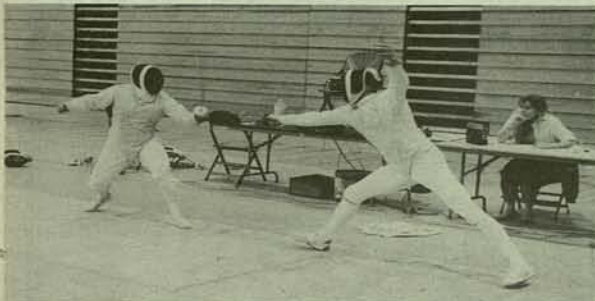

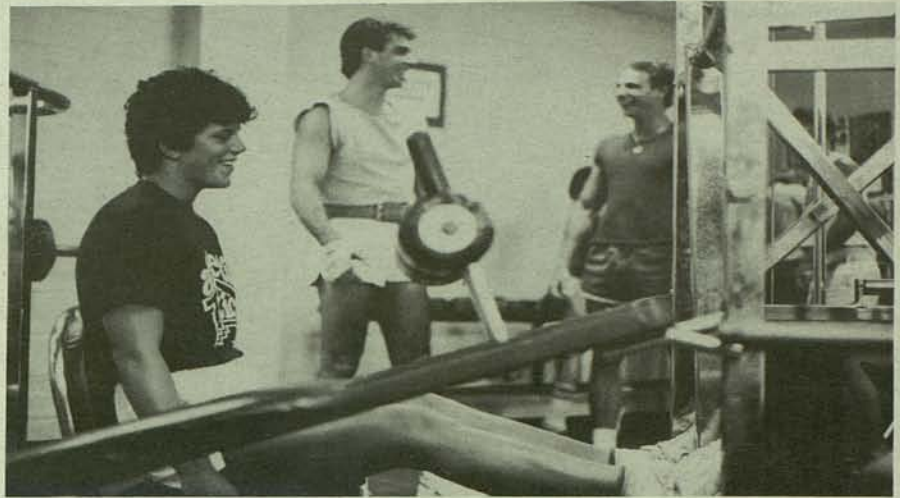

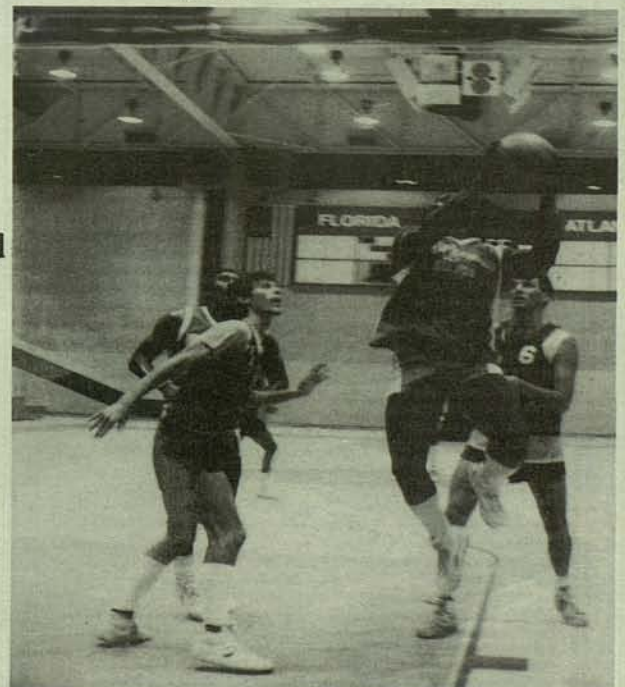
FAU men's tennis team ahead of the competition

With four returning veterans, and the expectation of adding only two new scholarship players, there is an opportunity to earn a position on the intercollegiate varsity team.



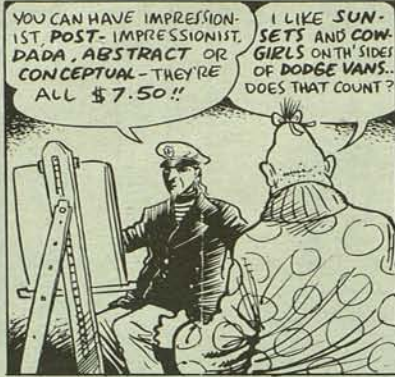
