KEEPING POSTED

AN AIRPHOTO ATLAS of rural areas of the entire United States, conceived by DR. SIMON BAKER and carried out with HENRY W. DILL JR., has just come off the U.S. Government printing press. "The Look of Our Land" shows, through approximately 1000 serial photographs, land use of non-urban areas in California, Oregon, Washington and Idaho. The 60-page first volume in the five-part series is subtitled "The Far West." Each page is an aerial photographic index of around 50 pic-

tures representing 100 square miles. Pictures may be enlarged to show details of forestry, dairy farming, etc. and appear three-dimensional when viewed through a stereoscope.

A YEAR OF STUDY ABROAD - at any time and in any country - are the terms of a \$2000 scholarship won by DONNA LYNN SMITH. The 20-year-old elementary education major received the award from the Aliancia Interamericana, Coral Gables, who in January named DONNA their Queen of the Americas. The money is donated by McArthur Dairies.

THE "SPACE SHIP" man rides on is being brought to the brink of catastrophe because there are too many passengers. That is the opinion of DR. HARRISON A. HOFFMANN as stated in an open letter to the editor of "Florida Planning and Development," a publication of the College of Social Science. It takes several generations to revise the cultural mores of a large society, and many ecologists believe there is not that much time left to us. The best hope for bringing about population stability is a vast campaign by press, radio and television, DR. HOFFMANN believes. "Population control can be sold with more sincerity and integrity and, hopefully, as effectively as automobiles and detergents," he said.

TRENDS AND DEVELOPMENTS in municipal finance administration will be discussed by public administrators and government employees at the 28th annual Conference for Municipal Clerks and Finance Officers, arranged by FAU, in Fort Lauderdale, April 12-15. Participants include F. PETER CLEMENTS, mayor of Fort Lauderdale, JOHN L. WESTBERRY, state department of revenue, and DR. MURRAY L. WEIDENBAUM, assistant secretary for economic policy, Wash., D.C.

FAU MATH STUDENTS rank 48th among U.S. and Canadian colleges and universities in the 30th annual William Lowell Putnam Mathematics Competition. The rank puts FAU first in the state of Florida, and the rank of team member MICHAEL MOORE makes him the highest ranking individual in the state. FAU team members are W. SAMUEL McALILY, HARRY McKIETHEN, ROBERT B. BEAVAN, N. SCOTT ALLEN and TRUETT SMITH. DR. M.J. DeLEON organized and directed a pre-competition problem-solving seminar for the students.

A DOUBLE HEADER ART DISPLAY, in the Library through mid-April, features the photographs and silk screens of Delray Beach photographer EDWARD WALLOWITCH. Paintings and drawings by KRISTINE KAY, graduate student and teaching assistant at the University of South Florida, are in the Humanities Little Gallery, room 32.

STATE REPRESENTATIVE D. ROBERT GRAHAM was guest speaker at the annual banquet of the American Association of University Professors, FAU chapter, March 31. REP. GRAHAM discussed "The Future of Higher Education in Florida: The Quiet Crisis of the 70s."
