## ANNOUNCEMENTS

ADVANCE NOTICE OF REGISTRATION for the Mini School, Summer 1970, is made to staff and faculty of FAU and to 1969 registrants. The first 150 students, ages 5-13, will be registered. Classes will be held 8:30 a.m. to noon, Monday through Friday, June 29-Aug. 7 in the Alexander D. Henderson University School. Kindergarten applicants must have reached their fifth birthday no later than June 29. Fee is \$60.

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NEW POLICY GOVERNING OPERATING CAPITAL OUTLAY (OCO), effective July 1, 1970, is as follows: Property, to be acquired from OCO funds, is that which can be defined as real or personal tangible property of a nonconsumable nature, the value of which is \$100 or more, the normal expected life of which is one year or more.

Exceptions to the \$100 limitation to be included as property are:

- a. All books, bound periodicals, films, tapes and maps which form part of a library must be classified, regardless of cost, as "property"
- b. Tape recorders, watches, binoculars and other "attractive" items as are from time to time added to this list. These will be purchased from OCO even though individual items can cost less than \$100.

Exceptions which are not property, regardless of cost:

- a. Simple manpowered hand tools such as wrenches, calipers, scalpels, diamond knives can be classified as Expense rather than OCO even though an individual item may cost \$100 or more.
- b. Glassware and other materials which are breakable may be purchased from Expense even though individual items exceed \$100 or more.

FAU personnel may use these slots - not to exceed 15 minutes - when on errands to the Ad building.
