#### NEW TRAFFIC REGULATIONS IN EFFECT

State statutes are very specific regarding the enforcement of parking and traffic regulations on state university campuses.

The Traffic Regulations of Florida Atlantic University, approved by the Board of Regents on October 9, have been rewritten in conformity with these State statutes which leave the University no alternative. The attention of all persons using motor vehicles on campus is particularly directed to the following: ANY INDIVIDUAL WHO RECEIVES A TRAFFIC CITATION MUST PAY THE SPECIFIED FINE AT THE SECURITY OFFICE. IF THE FINE IS NOT PAID WITHIN 10 CALENDAR DAYS OF THE CITATION, THE OFFENSE WILL BE REFERRED TO THE ADJACENT MUNICIPALITY (BOCA RATON) FOR TRIAL.

Prior to the enactment of these Traffic Regulations, the time limit for the payment of fines was only 5 school days. Fines which have been collected in the past have been spent for traffic aids and scholarships. This will continue for fines paid within the 10 days. However, fines paid after the violation is turned over to the city become a part of the city's funds and do not aid the University.

While the Florida Statute (F.S. 239.56) allows for the establishment of a traffic court on campus FOR STUDENTS ONLY, President Kenneth R. Williams, following conferences with Student Government leaders, has announced that this option would not be exercised at this time.

#### KEEPING POSTED

ENROLLMENT for the Fall Quarter exceeded a predicted number of full-time-equivalency students by nearly eight percent. Budgeted by the State for 4152 FTEs (one FTE = 15 student hours), enrollment figures reflect 4469 FTEs and 5281 students. "We are particularly pleased with the number of students coming to us for graduate study," commented DR. DONALD SCHWARTZ.

TWENTY-FIVE TOP ENGINEERS of the Pratt and Whitney Aircraft Corporation of West Palm Beach are the first students in a new program underwritten by the company and the College of Business and Public Administration. It is a non-credit management training course developed by DR. THEODORE KLISTON and designed to give business backgrounds to employees with special skills.

DR. EDWARD DELAMATER is director of a project, "Collaborative Research on Differentiation of Marine Predatory Gastropod Populations," which has been funded in the amount of \$11,500 by the National Science Foundation.

A VALUE OF \$16,000 has been placed on eight used Tektronix Oscilloscopes given to the College of Engineering by RCA Information Systems Division. They are the latest of several such gifts from RCA.
