KEEPING POSTED

GOVERNOR REUBIN ASKEW spoke July 28 at ribbon cutting ceremonies for the 40th Street bridge which now links FAU's perimeter road with AlA and the ocean beaches.

<u>EUGENE A. ROBINSON RESIGNED</u> effective July 15 to accept a position as vice president for association development at First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Delray Beach. Since 1964 he has been special assistant to PRESIDENT WILLIAMS and has also served as director of alumni affairs.

<u>GETTING MORE DISADVANTAGED YOUTH</u> into the country's junior colleges is the goal of the second largest university grant awarded by the Division of College Support, Department of Health, Education and Welfare, this year. FAU has received \$142,800 for a two-year program described as "an extension of the Upward Bound idea" by its director, DR. LAWRENCE E. SMITH. Seventy teachers from Florida, Georgia, Alabama and Mississippi will be trained who will have contact with approximately 10,000 prospective or currently enrolled disadvantaged junior college students. The program will serve as a training model for projects outside the area.

THE COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING has received two recent gifts: a 19-foot Evinrude boat from S. D. Murphy, Ft. Lauderdale, for the department of ocean engineering, and a Genisco G-Accelerator from Electronic Systems Division, Dynamics Corporation of America, Boynton Beach, for the department of mechanical engineering.

<u>A GRANT IN THE AMOUNT OF</u> \$21,200 has again been given to the department of exceptional child education (T-10 project) by the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. It will continue to fund FAU's programs for the professional preparation of personnel to teach handicapped children. FAU has been receiving grants from HEW since 1967.

TWENTY-SEVEN DISADVANTAGED HIGH SCHOOL YOUTH provided by the Economic Opportunities Coordinating Groups of Broward and Palm Beach counties are working on campus under the Neighborhood Youth Corps Summer Program. <u>RECENT LEGISLATIVE ACTION</u> established the following use of registration fees in the state's public universities:

Tuition fee for non-Florida students, in addition to the above, is now \$350, with 9 hours considered the minimum for full time. Part time fee is \$27 per credit hour.

The law also provides that the building, student financial aid and capital improvement fees are to be remitted to the Board of Regents for allocation among the several universities. The student financial aid trust fund fee will be remitted to the Board of Education to be administered by the Department of Education.

A further ruling of the legislation provides for adjustment of the fees by the Board of Regents "for experimental programs of differential fees to even enrollments over four quarters."

UNIVERSITY CENTER UNDERWAY - FINALLY

Work on the \$1,700,000 University Center project at Florida Atlantic University will get underway Monday, August 2 when the general contractor, Wiggs and Maale of West Palm Beach, are slated to bring in their equipment and locate their construction shed. The Wiggs and Maale contract is for \$1,368,000. Under terms of the agreements, the Board of Regents has 60 days in which to accept two alternates in the amount of \$325,250 which would provide for a large multi-purpose room which FAU students and administration have both called essential. State University System Chancellor Robert B. Mautz has pledged the additional funds for the alternates according to a letter from Robert G. Graf, associate physical planning officer for the Board of Regents, to the Department of Housing and Urban Development, Atlanta.

ALUMNI HAVE NEW PRESIDENT

RON KOSTAMO, 1967 graduate of Florida Atlantic University, has been named president of the FAU Alumni Association to fill the unexpired term of Hilmer Erickson who resigned recently to move to Minnesota. Erickson was named a director-at-large. Kostamo is traffic manager for Southern Bell and resides in Plantation. He received a bachelor of science degree in the FAU College of Science and has been serving as vice president of the Alumni Association. Election of new officers takes place in the fall and the newly elected officers and directors take over on January 1.
