KEEPING POSTED

AN UNRESTRICTED GRANT OF \$5000 has been given the ocean engineering department by Amoco Production Foundation, New Orleans, La. P.J. EARLY, division engineer, presented the gift to DR. KENNETH R. WILLIAMS and PROFESSOR CHARLES R. STEPHAN. The grant will be used for department scholarships and other support of the program. Twelve FAU graduates and six cooperative work/study students have been employed by Amoco Production Company. In addition, three of the work/study students have also been employed by the company.

<u>DR. HANS MARGOLIUS</u> will be presented Wed., October 20, at 8:00 p.m. by the philosophy department in conjunction with Phi Sigma Tau (Philosophy Honorary Society). His paper is titled, "The Uses of Philosophy in Life." The lecture will be held in DR. ROBERT SCHWARZ'S home.

THE FIRST NATIONAL TRAVELLING EXHIBITION OF FACULTY WORK sponsored by the department of art has begun its second show at West Liberty State College, West Liberty, W. Va. The exhibition's first showing was at Broward Community College. The exhibition will be on continuous tour through July, 1972, appearing at colleges and universities in Pennsylvania, Kansas, Utah, Vermont, New York, Wisconsin, and South Dakota. The show will be in Florida again in December at Palm Beach Junior College Gallery and at the FAU Gallery during January of 1972.

THE NEW DEPARTMENT OF MECHANICAL ENGINEERING has received its first gift. A brand new heat pump, worth \$1000, has been donated through the FAU Foundation by Rheem Air Conditioning, Boca Raton.

JAMES SCHIETINGER has two series of his work exhibited in the "Photo Media Show" in New York for a month. The show consists of elements and techniques of photography experienced as an artistic medium.

DR. MARC R. FEIX, professor of physics at the University of Nancy, France, is conducting a series of graduate seminars at FAU in October and November. He is lecturing to graduate students on computational models in plasma physics, on non-homogenous plasma and on the stability of plasmas.
