BUDGET PLAN OUTLINED TO SENATE

PRESIDENT GLENWOOD L. CREECH, briefing the University Senate on the budget cutbacks ordered by the state, said FAU's \$411,845 reduction has been met by cutting \$92,283 from the budget for Other Personal Services, \$72,219 from Expense and \$247,343 from Operating Capital Outlay.

The plan was approved recently by the University budget committee. Dr. Creech said \$50,000 reserve funds will be maintained in the Expense and OCO budgets, in case additional reductions are ordered.

"If there are no other reductions, these reserves will be released to the academic departments and the Library," he said.

(Dr. Creech issued a memorandum recently on the University's financial standing. Copies were sent to each unit within the University. If you have not seen one, contact your department head.)

PAUL SAMUELSON TO SPEAK ON CAMPUS

The next speaker in the Distinguished Lecture Series is DR. PAUL SAMUELSON, professor of economics at Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Nobel Laureate. Dr. Samuelson's topic is "The Cloudy Economic Outlook." The lecture is set for 8:30 p.m. on March 10, in the theatre. The public is invited.

HEALTH INSURANCE BOOKLET AVAILABLE AT PERSONNEL

A booklet on the benefits and coverages of the revised State Sponsored Health Insurance program is now available at the Personnel Department. The booklet contains details on the changes enacted in the program last October, including an increase in the surgical fee schedule, the addition of a supplemental accident benefit and payment of hospital charges for dental surgery if hospitalization was required. EXAMINATION DEADLINES APPROACH

Feb. 28 is the deadline for applying in HU 140 to take the foreign language proficiency examinations in the Spring Quarter. If the student cannot take the exam in the quarter for which he originally applied, a new application must be submitted for any subsequent quarter.

The deadline for applying to take the ED.S and ED.D qualifying examinations is March 14. Students should have an accepted program on file in the Office of Graduate Studies, have completed at least three-fourths of the course work for the degree program and have filled out an application form.
