UNITED FUND DRIVE BEGINS

Volunteers for the United Fund will be making campus contacts Nov. 1-5 seeking contributions to aid 17 agencies.

President GLENWOOD CREECH, who heads Boca Raton's Public Service Division in the current drive, said, "The United Fund's policy is 'Give where you work, receive where you live.' The University is again making it possible for each of us to contribute by the payroll deduction method should we wish to use it. I urge you to give earnest consideration to a pledge to the United Fund this year and to welcome the United Fund volunteer when you are contacted."

FAU-FIU MERGER PROPOSAL DRAWS OPPOSITION

A report that the SUS is considering the possible merger of FAU and FIU has brought strong opposition from concerned groups and area leaders who fear that such a development would erase the positive identity developed by FAU since its founding in 1962.

According to newspaper accounts, Chancellor E. T. YORK said the discussion paper "is not meant to reflect the position of the Board of Regents or the staff. It's just an effort to get the issues out so they can be discussed.

"There's no reason for anyone to get upset about this option or any other until we reach some answers." He repeated the remarks in meetings at the FAU campus last week.

Both the Boca Raton Chamber of Commerce and the Florida Atlantic University Foundation, Inc. have issued position papers opposing the revival of plans to merge the two state universities. Such proposals had originally been discussed before FIU was developed.

The Boca Raton News editorially saw the proposal as a serious threat to FAU and to the city of Boca Raton. Opposition has also been voiced in newspaper articles quoting State Senator PHIL LEWIS (D-WPB) and former House minority leader DON REED among others.

INOCULATION PROGRAM A SUCCESS

Over 10,000 men and women received swine flu inoculations at the University Center Oct. 26-28 in the national preventive program. Although the line stretched half way around the building during peak morning hours, there were no long delays, no complaints and no injuries. Palm Beach County Health Department officials were very pleased with the physical arrangements and expressed appreciation to the University for its cooperation.

REGENTS OPPOSE PROPOSAL TO LIMIT NUMBER OF EMPLOYEES

The Board of Regents has issued its opposition to proposed state constitutional amendment No. 6 which would limit the number of state employees to one per cent of the state's population and would cap the number of part-time state employees at ten per cent of the full-time employees.

BOR Chairman MARSHALL CRISER said the amendment would have a crippling effect on the state universities and other areas of state government. He said it would jeopardize the jobs of several thousand salaried university employees and part-time workers, including students. Amendment 6 will be on the Nov. 2 ballot.

DR. YORK SPEAKS AT FT. LAUDERDALE CENTER DEDICATION

Dr. E. T. York, chancellor of the SUS, gave the main address at the dedication of the Ft. Lauderdale Center last Thursday as part of a three-day visit to the Gold Coast.

Arriving on campus Tuesday evening, he met with media representatives in the Board of Regents Room.

The following morning at 8 he addressed members of the Boca Raton Chamber of Commerce in the Gold Coast Room. Shortly after his talk, Dr. York met with Career Service personnel and later with students and student government members.

Following a luncheon and speech before the Boca Raton Rotary Club meeting at the Boca Raton Country Club, Dr. York met with the Council of Deans and directors. The same afternoon he also met with the Steering and Policy Committee and with department chairmen and faculty. Dinner time meant a visit with DR. HAROLD MANOR at Palm Beach Junior College.

On Thursday morning, Dr. York met with State Rep. BILL JAMES in Delray Beach, with Sen. HARRY JOHNSTON II in West Palm Beach and with Sen. PHIL LEWIS in Riviera Beach.

Following the dedication ceremonies, Dr. York ended his busy day at a dinner with the FAU Foundation, Alumni and Advisors.

Friday at 7:30 a.m. he addressed the Ft. Lauderdale Chamber of Commerce coffee meeting at the Governor's Club Hotel and then met with State Rep. VAN POOLE and Sen. JON C. THOMAS.

At noon he addressed the Economic Council of Palm Beach County at the Boca Raton Hotel and Club before returning to Gainesville.

FAU FOUNDATION ELECTS

VETERAN EDUCATION BENEFITS EXTENDED

The Veterans Education and Employment Assistance Act of 1976, signed by President GERALD FORD on Oct. 15, provides for an increase of educational benefits for qualified veterans.

"The law extends education benefits from 36 to 46 months," said JOHN ECKHART, Veteran Affairs coordinator at FAU. "Benefits have also been increased from \$270 to \$292 basic for a single student with no dependents. Married veterans will now receive \$347 monthly plus \$24 for each dependent child."

All currently eligible veterans may take advantage of the extended benefits. The increases now cover graduate students as well as undergraduates, Eckhart said.
