ED.S. AND ED.D. QUALIFYING EXAMS SCHEDULED

The filing deadline is Oct. 19 for the Ed.S. and Ed.D. qualifying examinations to be given on campus Nov. 5 through 8. To be eligible to take the exam, students should have been admitted to the Ed.S. or Ed.D. program and have at least 75 percent of the course work completed. Also, an approved Supervisory Committee form, an accepted program of study, and a properly signed application form should be on file in the Office of Graduate Studies, Room 104C, Education Building 1, where applications are available.

LANGUAGE EXAM DEADLINE NOV. 16

November 16 is the deadline for receipt of applications for the Foreign Language Proficiency Examination to satisfy the foreign language requirement. Applications must be submitted in the quarter in which the student wishes to take the examination. Applications may be obtained in HU 140.

POSTDOCTORAL FELLOWSHIPS FOR MINORITIES AVAILABLE

A National Research Council program, designed to provide opportunities for continued education and experience in research to minorities holding doctorate degrees, will provide approximately 25 one-year fellowships to Black Americans, Mexican American/Chicanos, Puerto Ricans, and Native Americans. Applicants must be U.S. citizens and be engaged in college or university teaching. New doctorate recipients who intend to pursue careers as college or university faculty members will also be considered. The deadline date for the submission of applications is Feb. 1, 1980.
