### LABOR UNIONS TOPIC OF LECTURE NOV. 15

"American Labor Unions as Organizations" will be the topic of a free public lecture Thursday, Nov. 15, at 4:30 p.m. in Room 141 of Fleming Hall. The speaker, Dan C. Helman, studies coordinator for the National Right to Work Foundation, is the author of *Trade Unions and Labor Relations in the U.S.S.R.* and *American Labor Unions*, both published by the Council on American Affairs. The program is the first scheduled by the MBA Forum, a series recently instituted by the College of Business and Public Administration. The Forum will schedule speakers to lecture on subjects of interest to the business community and to faculty and students.

### ENERGY EXPERT TO LECTURE HERE

Dr. Barry Commoner, author, professor and advocate of solar energy development, will speak on "The Future of Energy" Thursday, Nov. 15, at 8 p.m. on the Outdoor Stage. ## FAU TO HOLD HONORS CONVOCATION NOV. 27

FAU will recognize its top scholars and a distinguished teacher during the 11th annual Honors Convocation Tuesday, Nov. 27, at 10:30 a.m. in the University Theatre. The University will confer the 1978/79 Distinguished Teacher Award on a member of the faculty selected by students in a process that began last year. Nominations submitted in campus-wide balloting were narrowed down by the University Student Advisory Committee, which made the final selection. The recipient, whose name remains a closely guarded secret until the Convocation, will deliver the main address.

Recognition will also be given to ten outstanding students. One student will receive a \$1,000 scholarship from a fund established in memory of the late Dr. S.E. Wimberly, who originated the Convocation. A Phi Kappa Phi scholarship award \$500 will be given to one student and eight students will be named University Scholars and will each receive \$250 scholarships made possible by a donation from Dr. Alfred A. Richman.

Classes will be dismissed and most campus offices will be closed during the Convocation so that all students, faculty and staff can attend. The public is also welcome.
