University Center to reduce hours

The University Center (UC) at FAU's central campus is reducing its hours of service due to a shortage in funds to meet its operational costs.

"Basically, it's (the UC) going to really

be hit in three major areas: the Information Desk, Games Room and reservations," said Steve Flaman, acting assistant director of operations at the UC.

"It's going to effect it drastically," added Jack Scopes, the UC's Assistant Director of Programs. "We're going to

basically close down at 5:00 p.m."

The UC, funded by student government, is now unable to pay its employees or operational fees due to a lack of incoming money.

"We haven't been funded for two years the way we needed to be," said Scopes.

"It's really not student government's fault. They don't have the funds themselves."

Jeff Stone, SG president, explained that SG did not receive its funding from the university.

Students at BCC grow in number

Thousands of new applicants have registered for classes at BCC this semester despite state funding for community colleges being cut.

According to the most recent statistics from Roy Twilley, Collegewide Registrar at BCC's Downtown center in Fort Lauderdale, approximately 28,094 students are currently registered at BCC compared to last year's 25,584 that were enrolled, an increase of more than 2,500 new applicants.

Factors contributing to such a dramatic increase, according to Twilley, include professionals returning to college and the growth of population in general.

"What we are seeing now is a general increase of students all across the board," said Twilley, "and as a result, students are going to find that the classes they want will be a little more difficult to obtain if they do not register early."

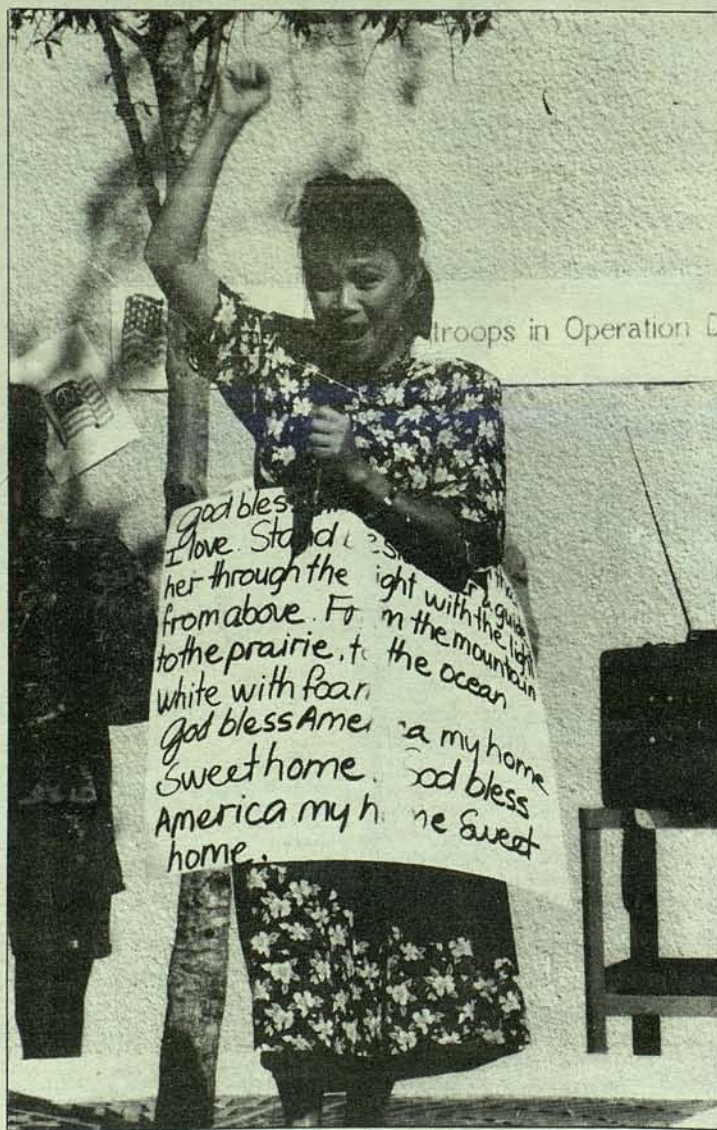
The number of students at BCC is not only increasing, but so is the amount of time they spend in class. According to Twilley, there has been an estimated 7.9 percent increase in the number of semester hours taken by students since last season.

With less funding for schools statewide and BCC being forced to cut spending drastically, more students are enrolled than are actually paid for, and the availability of the popular classes will be limited as a result Twilley said.

"We're still admitting students even with the limited finances available to us," said Twilley, "but students who work at night and need classes in the morning and early afternoon may not find it so easy to get if they procrastinate."

Santer speaks to management class on future goals of EEC

Students in an FAU management class were given a surprise lecture yesterday by the manager of one of the largest businesses in the world.

Prime Minister Jacques Santer of Luxembourg addressed Dr. Joel Ross' marketing class in Fleming Hall Wednesday morning.

Santer is also 36 days into his six-month term as president of the Council of the European Economic Community. The EEC is an economic union that comprises 12 countries and over 323 million people.

Dr. Gaston Schaber, Santer's senior advisor in research and development listened in class with the students as Santer spoke on topics spanning from the Persian Gulf to the problems of integrating a dozen countries with diverse ideas.

Santer, who admittedly has never taken a course in management, has high hopes and plans for the EEC. The first objective on his agenda is the adoption of a common EEC foreign policy. He feels that without a foreign policy, the EEC is "an economic giant, but a political dwarf."

"The weeks we have just lived through have served to dramatize the necessity for (a foreign policy) for the community," said Santer. "Monetary union without political union would be at best unfinished constructions."

Santer noted that the actions the EEC has tried to take in the Persian Gulf conflict since it started have carried little weight.

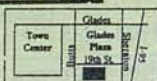

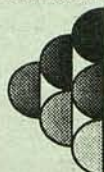

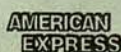

A lack of adequate parking on FAU's Boca Raton campus is not a critical problem yet, but it does need to be looked at now. The recent student growth explosion has brought FAU to a crossroads, and the character of the Boca Raton campus will be defined by how this issue is decided.

Semester after semester of record breaking enrollment will eventually take its toll on FAU's ability to meet the parking needs of its students. Witness the way that once empty campus fringe parking lots are more full than they were only a semester ago. Even lots that were traditionally underutilized have now become more crowded as new buildings have gone on line. With the opening of the new Social Sciences building this current semester the traffic in the adjoining lot virtually doubled. All of FAU's lots will be similarly affected as new buildings are constructed.

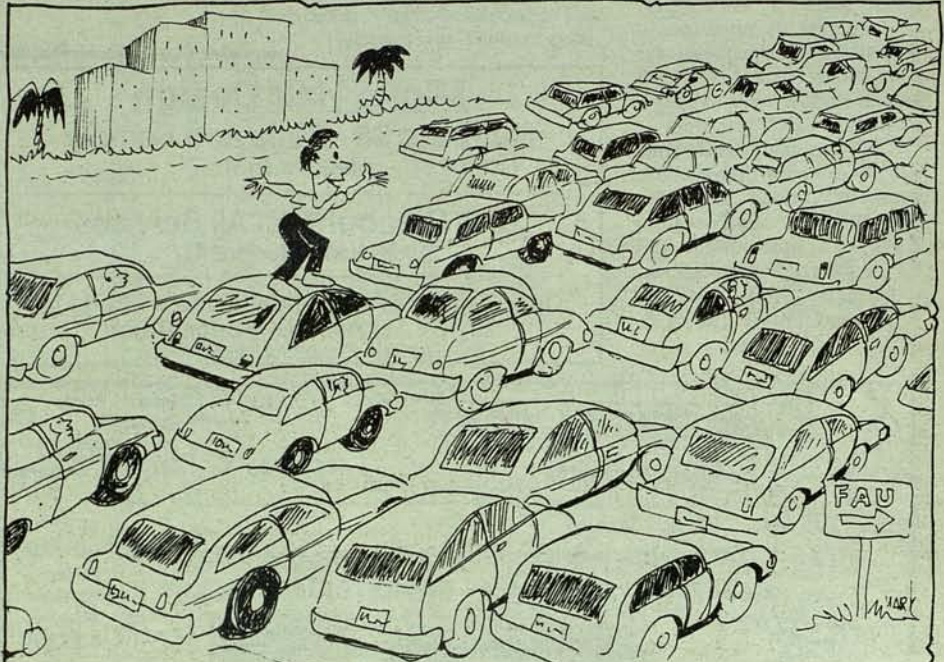
From the time of its creation FAU was blessed with an abundance of parking; old airstrips were easily converted to parking lots with little more than paint needed to make the change. And even now in 1991, FAU's ratio of two students per parking space is on par with other state universities. A parity that will surely change as student enrollment skyrockets and the number of parking spaces available doesn't.

FAU's ten year master plan, Strategic Plan 2000, envisions the Boca Raton campus as the hub of a FAU's multi-campus structure, with a student base expected to reach 20,000 over the next ten years. How the university expands parking facilities to meet the needs created by these additional students is an important issue now.

In the short term there are steps that can be taken to maximize the usefulness of the already constructed parking space, and put off new construction. Some lots can be improved through restriping parking space configuration to increase overall efficiency. The long term outlook, however, is that additional parking will have to be built.

In planning new lots, do you expand out, or expand up? Parking expansion should not come through the development of lands further out from the center of campus. That type of plan conjures up images of hundreds of more acres of FAU's landscape being buried under asphalt. Needs might be better met through the construction of a parking garage, a facility that could be located near the center of the campus, while occupying less land. This option will leave the campus green while improving service to students. Neither of the options will come cheaply though, and there certainly is no shortage of other highly visible important projects to fund. Ground level parking costs in the neighborhood of \$700 to \$1000 per space, and for parking garages the construction costs may reach \$6,000 per space. The reality is that policy is often driven by financial constraints rather than the desired end. Let this time be different; in this end, let the campus be green, not black with white lines.

Santer has played a part in two very critical periods of the EEC's growth. His last presidency was in 1985, the year that the community drafted a "white paper," to document its intentions to drop all individual economic carriers by December 31, 1992. Now in 1991 Santer is looking to cement the EEC's presence.

"The Community at that time was just emerging from a painful period of economic stagnation, emerging from the pervading European pessimism. The EEC's internal and external problems are still all too evident. Nothing can be taken for granted," said Santer.

Santer sees the "new Europe" as playing a large part in the world after January 1, 1993.

"The EEC must show a stronger presence, based on law. The community is a living one and will continue to grow in the years to come," said Santer.

"Last spring, the university budget office estimated A&S fees based on credit hours. They overestimated by 16 percent or approximately \$167,000. We estimated our budget on the fees (and) in the fall, the money didn't come," said Stone.

The budget problem resulted in SG cutting its own funding by about 20 percent and funding for other programs, including funding for the UC by 9.8 percent.

The ramifications of the money difficulties are already being felt at the UC.

"Before, clubs and organizations received use of the rooms and equipment for free," said Flaman. "We'll honor all reservations that have already been

made, (but), as far as new reservations, everyone will be charged."

"In charging, we'll be lucky to even cover our costs, but at least it's an effort," added Flaman.

Several students experienced the difficulty of obtaining courses this semester as a result of their own tardiness in registering.

"Before this term I just kind of shrugged off the warnings of the administration to register early, and when it came time for me to finally do it, I was forced to take a class at south (BCC campus) at night in order to get the credit I needed," said Anthony Pretsky, a BCC student at central campus. "I won't make that mistake again."

"We're losing a lot of money as far as operational costs."

"We have been cutting hours," said Melissa Crockett, an FAU student who works in the

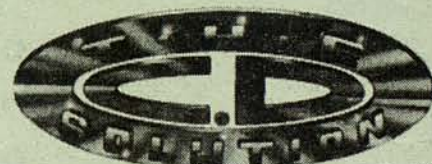

Home finale for swim team

Having finished ninth in last year's Nationals, and ranked No. 4 in NCAA Division II last fall, the FAU Women's Swim Team is winding down its regular season meet schedule before tapering for the Metro Conference Championships and this year's Nationals in Brown Deer, Wisconsin.
