Dorm fees to rise sharply for 1991-92

BOCA RATON -- For FAU dorm resident Tracy Bastante the latest announced 12.5% housing fee rise may be the straw that broke the camel's back.

"This is crazy!" said Bastante, a Student Government Senator, in response to the announcement by Director of Housing Ron Scharnweber that dorm rates would rise sharply again. "Students won't be able to afford to live on campus if this keeps up."

"Wha's going on here?" Bastante questioned. "My housing fees have risen from \$480 to \$765 since 1988. That's just not fair."

Mr. Scharnweber, addressing the Student Government Senate March 28, pointed to a marked increase in inflation to justify the increase.

The director of housing called the 12.5% increase "moderate."

"Stability in the rate of inflation has been helpful in moderating housing operation costs," Mr. Scharnweber wrote in a report to the senate. "Yet not all commodities remain static. Price increases continue to have an impact."

"The impact of increases in operating costs for housing is easier to comprehend when a year to year comparison is made of the costs for products and services," the housing director continued.

Mr. Scharnweber broke down

the costs increases by citing cost increases in everything from ballpoint pens to post-it notes to utilities and labor charges.

The director of housing pointed out that there will be in-

creases in services to students in 1991-92, including a new building with multi-purpose room and kitchen and custodial workshops and central mailboxes that will give each student

his own mailbox.

Dr. Karl F. Ijams, FAU dean of students, noted that Mr. Scharnweber has been able to keep FAU's housing costs among the lowest in the state.

"FAU's housing situation is one of the most fiscally responsible in the country and FAU is one institution where housing cost rises are kept well below the

SG hopefuls to debate Monday

BOCA RATON -- The four remaining candidates for FAU Student Government president and vice president will square-off in a "no holds barred" hour long debate at 10:30 a.m. Monday in the breezeway north of the cafeteria.

The run-off for SG president and vice-president will be held on Tuesday and Wednesday, April 9 and 10. The polls will be open from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. at four polling sites -- in the Boca breezeway, in Boca's Fleming Hall, on the Davie campus, and in the Ft. Lauderdale Tower.

Four-way races for president and vice president ended with no candidate receiving a majority. SG statutes call for a run-off between the top two candidates when no majority is achieved.

Presidential aspirants Steve Feinland and Frank Virella have been the most vocal of the run-off candidates.

Both candidates have emphasized that students must become more aware of the distribution of Activities and Service fees Student Government assesses. Students pay \$5 per credit hour for A&S fees.

Feinland has attacked Virella for addressing only issues that are no longer issues, and Virella has responded by saying that his issues are still viable because they need to be carried through to fruition.

"We have to debate," said Feinland, who is a member of President Jeff Stone's cabinet.

Jennifer Green, SG elections liaison who will serve as moderator during the debate, said each candidate will be given three minutes for an opening statement and then 90 seconds to respond to their opponents.

The debate will then be thrown open

Statewide UFF elects FAU's Kris Anderson president

BOCA RATON -- Associate Professor of Sociology Kris Anderson has been elected president of the statewide United Faculty of Florida thus becoming the first FAU member to head the union that represents over 10,000 Florida university teachers.

Dr. Anderson, who is in her 12th year at FAU, was elected virtually by acclamation by the over 3,000 UFF members in statewide voting that concluded last week.

She was unopposed, considered by many a tribute to Dr. Anderson's diligent efforts over the last two years as the chief negotiator in the current contract bargaining with the Florida Board of Regents and the Florida Legislature.

"My first goal as president of the UFF is surviving the current legislative session," said Dr. Anderson, who began her career at FAU in 1979.

Dr. Anderson noted that the Florida Legislature is talking about salary increases, but the increases would come out of a vastly reduced state funding budget for universities.

We may get a pay increase, but our working conditions may be a lot worse if the current legislative mood continues," she said.

Dr. Anderson succeeds Broward Community College faculty member Jim Wilson as UFF president. Dr. Anderson was UFF vice president for the last two years.

"I think that Dr. Anderson has the experience and the background to be a really excellent president for UFF, and she has outstanding dedication and energy for the job," said Dr. Wilson.

BCC's Native American Week highlights Seminole Indian culture

Highlights of Native American week at Broward Community College March 17-22 included a Planetarium show called "The People," Seminole Indian food tasting, Art displays, A Seminole dance group, and various speeches and forums held by BCC Administrators and guest speakers.

us every day," says Lowe. "Therefore, a program as such is very beneficial in the development of our understanding of the world we live in."

national average," Dean Ijams noted.

Mr. Scharnweber said the housing increase had nothing to do with his office's underestimation of the amount of FU dorm residents in fall 1991 which

resulted in the university renting rooms from the Radisson Hotel to house students.

He said the university does not expect another overbooking situation like the fall of 1991. Mr. Scharnweber pointed to the fact

that there are presently 40-50 vacancies in the dorms.

Mr. Scharnweber said within the next couple of years additional campus housing will house an additional several hundred students.

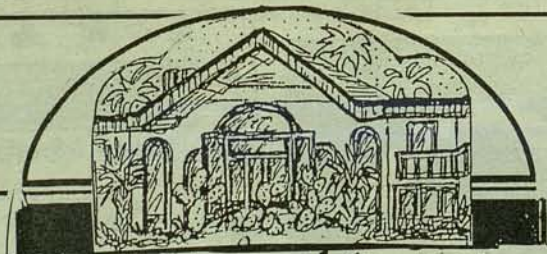

Dr. Wilson took a leave of absence from his teaching position and for the last four years has dedicated himself solely to being the full-time president of the UFF.

UFF represents faculty in the state university system, most of the graduate assistants in the state university system, and monay community colleges," noted Dr. Wilson. "The UFF presidency is something you have to do full-time or the job doesn't get done. Kris Anderson will do the job."

Being the president of UFF is a great honor for FAU, and it is a great honor to have someone of Dr. Anderson's capability as president of the UFF," Wilson continued.

"Dr. Anderson is a great listener and what you always do as president of the UFF is listen to what the membership wants, and if you'll listen to the faculty and other employees in the state, their advice has almost always been correct," said Dr. Wilson. "That goes for all the leadership coming into the UFF."

Succeeding Dr. Anderson as vice president is Dr. Tom Auxter from the department of philosophy, University of Florida.

Dr. Anderson is expected to give up her FAU teaching duties while she is UFF president, but still continue her research.

The statewide union and FAU is truly blessed to have Kris Anderson as the UFF president," said Dr. Lynn Appleton, president of the FAU union.

The United Faculty of Florida (UFF) represents over 10,000 faculty in the nine state universities, several community colleges, and one private college -- St. Leo College.

Dr. Anderson noted that only 30% of the faculty are dues-paying members of the UFF, but the union does the negotiating for all the faculty at the institutions they represent.

Dr. Anderson has hammered out agreements with the Board of Regents in all areas of the 1991-92 and 1992-93 contract, except in the percentage of salary increases and faculty compensation for teaching summer school.

The UFF president-elect, who will start her two-year term August 15, said the BOR is holding firm at a 3% proposed salary increase while the union is asking for 6%.

Also, the BOR and the UFF are at an impasse on the amount faculty should receive for teaching summer school. The BOR is offering faculty 2.75% of their academic year salary for each credit hour they teach. The union is seeking 4.1% pre credit hour.

But, Dr. Anderson notes that a bigger problem might be in the area of the amount the Florida Legislature dedicates to universities.

We are urging the people of Florida to contact their legislators and take political action in calling for monies for universities," Dr. Anderson said. "Each university has specific needs, therefore people down here should call their legislators and tell them of FASU's needs, and we have found that they do listen to us."

In what Coach Wayne Allen thought would be a rebuilding year for the FAU Women's Basketball Team after losing several players from last year, including all-American Valene Harris, the Lady Owls finished their season with a 23-6 record at the North Central Regional Tournament.

Bettering last year's 22-7 record, the Owls made it to the regionals as the nation's premier

NCAA Division II rebounding team.

However, FAU was matched against a North Dakota team who had home court advantage in the first round, and it proved to be too much for the team. Tied with fourth ranked North Dakota at 10-10, the Owls then went scoreless for seven minutes to give their opponents a lead they couldn't overcome. Led by Kim Hicks' 27 points, FAU played even with North Dakota

in the second half before losing 94-78. FAU was outshot 49% to 41% by North Dakota who eventually lost to North Dakota State in the championship game.

Hicks, Karen Thomas, and Darra Baker are three senior starters that Coach Allen will lose this year. Hicks was named District All-American at the season's end.

Next year should prove to be a good challenge for the Lady Owls. They play a heavier

Division I schedule which includes National Champion Tennessee and seven tournament teams. With 10 players returning, Allen has already recruited top prospects Laura Woods and Vivian Curtis. He expects to recruit four more top players.

Allen, who just returned from scouting the women's finals in New Orleans, will welcome players back to pre-season training on October 15.
